



Lap Dog Rescue Opens First Location, Plans for Spay & Neuter Clinic in 2024

Lap Dog Rescue of New Mexico (LDRNM) is pleased to announce its first permanent location to provide a 'home base' for organization activities. The space is located in the Express Vet building at 3924 Carlisle Blvd NE in Albuquerque.

LDRNM Board President Brian Spence said, "Dr. Pfiefer and Express Vet have been a great community collaborator for Lap Dog Rescue for several years, and we are excited to see this collaboration grow." Spence added that Express Vet provides spay/neuter services, as well as has a groomer on staff, so it is a win-win-win for LDRNM.

LDRNM plans to host adoption events at its new location, with additional plans in the

works in 2024. "Our group of fosters and volunteers do amazing work in saving more than 300 dogs each year," Spence said, "but the core of the pet population issue is ensuring all dogs in our communities are spayed and neutered." LDRNM is currently seeking grant funding to support community spay/neuter clinics which Express Vet and Dr. Pfiefer will perform.

Lap Dog Rescue 2023 Giving Guide

Thank you to all of our donors and supporters who have given this year! 2023 continued to be a challenging year for dog rescue organizations, and more dogs than ever have needed our help. As we look towards 2024, please consider how your financial contribution can support Lap Dog Rescue and help us do more. \$1,500 - Ensures 12 dogs are spayed or neutered, and microchipped.

\$1,000 - Ensures 10 dogs receive their pre-adoption veterinary check-ups, tests, and shots.

\$750 - Provides food for 15 foster dogs for two months.

\$500 - Provides 15 dogs with grooming, including bathing, tangle/knot trimming, and flea/tick dips.

\$250 - Provides flea/tick preventative for 30 dogs for one month.

\$100 - Provides a new collar/harness and ID tag for four of our pups (which goes with them to their new homes!)



Because of generous donations, Lap Dog Rescue was recently able to purchase a Pet Tag system so each of our adopted dogs goes to their new homes with an ID tag!





How does a Lap Dog that is being fostered get adopted?

Once the foster dog parent thinks the Lap Dog is ready to be adopted into its forever home, the foster dog parent creates a description and takes a clear photo of the pup. This information is provided to our Lap Dog Rescue admins, who then post the available dogs on Facebook and on our website under Adoptables on Mondays and Thursdays each week. Applications from potential adopters are submitted electronically, and our fosters spend time reviewing the applications and selecting and interviewing the applicant(s) they feel most closely matches the needs of the dog. Our goal is to place our rescue dogs in loving, forever homes, and we do this through a rigorous screening and adoption process.
